Notes and corrections

- In knockout matches questions should not be paired (why 'waste' pairs when non-paired questions are much easier to set?). Also, for knockout qualifying matches, there is no need to include an extra time round or tie-breaker, as a draw is an acceptable result.
- 2. Peel was not on the grassy knoll when Kennedy was shot, nor was he in the jail when Oswald was killed. He **was** working in Dallas at the time (though not for the *Dallas News*) and—pretending to be from the *Liverpool Echo*—blagged his way into a press conference at which Oswald was presented to the media.
- 3. An equally acceptable answer is Darwin's other grandfather, Erasmus Darwin, who was famous as a doctor, philosopher and anti-slavery campaigner.
- 4. Completing the original line up with Reed, Cale and Morrison was percussionist Angus Maclise, who was replaced by Tucker in November 1965.
