Notes and corrections

- 1. The details given are for James Gordon Bennett **Senior**. The expression 'Gordon Bennett' is thought to refer to his son, James Gordon Bennett **Junior**, who was born in New York City in 1841.
- 2. The overwhelming majority of sources state that the last book of the New Testament is *The Revelation of St. John the Divine*, more commonly known as *Revelation(s)* or *Apocalypse*. The *Second Book of Maccabees* is usually regarded to be the last book of the *Apocrypha*: a collection of books usually found either between the Old and New Testaments or after the New Testament, depending on the Bible version.
- 3. Bristle toothbrushes were in use for several hundred years prior to Addis becoming the first to <u>mass</u> produce them.
- 4. The coffee percolator was invented in the late eighteenth century and patented in the mid to late nineteenth century. Hobbs invented an **electric** percolator.
- 5. 'Hardress Waller' is an equally acceptable answer, but obviously doesn't fit the theme.
- 6. Vitamin B₁₂ performs many roles in the human body, so whilst the given answer is correct, there are numerous other, equally valid answers.

- 7. Chelsea's Petr Čech became the third three-time winner when he shared the 2013–14 award with Arsenal's Wojciech Szczęsny.
- 8. Equally acceptable, if less commonly used, answers are 'beestings' and 'first milk'.
- 9. Curling also featured in the 1924 (Chamonix) games and was a demonstration sport in 1932 (Lake Placid), 1988 (Calgary) and 1992 (Albertville).

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
