Notes

- 1. These include First Lord of the Treasury, Lord Chief Justice, Commander-in-Chief, Lord High Admiral, Master of the Buckhounds, Groom of the Back Stairs, Archbishop of Titipu and Lord Mayor; any of these would appear to be a 'not incorrect' answer to this question.
- 2. The programme's correct name is *The Herbs*.
- 3. The UK has fifteen, not thirteen, national parks.
- 4. Unless specified otherwise, the surname only is an acceptable answer. As three Earps (Virgil, Wyatt and Morgan) were involved in the gunfight, it may have been appropriate to ask for the full name.
- 5. Dexter was born on 15 May 1935, not 1939.

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
