Notes

- 1. Teams may answer by giving a surname only, so it is better not to include a theme/connecting word in a person's first name or title.
- 2. It is usually referred to by its full name: the Gotthard base tunnel.
- 3. The islands (and Abersoch) are at the south-**eastern** tip of the Llyn Peninsula.
- 4. 'Ynys Bŷr', the Welsh name for Caldey Island, is an acceptable answer. There is also another smaller, tidal island (i.e. it's only an island when the tide is 'in') called 'St Catherine's Island' or 'Ynys Catrin'.

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
