Notes

- 1. Scores ranging from 28 to 52 (average 41.0) suggest that the questions were a bit too tough.
 - Once again ALL question setters are reminded of the question-setting guidelines:

Don't make the questions too hard: this is the Stockport Quiz League, not University Challenge, and is meant to be a fun night out! As a general rule-of-thumb all teams should be able to answer at least half the questions correctly, so aggregate scores shouldn't be lower than 80 and ideally no team will score under 40.

- 2. 'Nissan' is an equally acceptable answer.
- 3. <u>Mambo No. 5</u> is a **song** composed by Dámaso Pérez 'Prez' Prado, whereas <u>Mambo</u> is a **style** of music/dance that originated in Cuba and may have been (at least partly) inspired by <u>Arsenio Rodríguez</u>.
- 4. Although it doesn't fit the theme, 'snooker' is an equally acceptable answer, as can be seen at the start of this clip on YouTube.
- 5. Only one of the answers (*Mambo No.5*) is actually a TV sports theme tune, so it might be more accurate to say they are *related to* or *suggest* sporting theme tunes.
- 6. The two songs didn't share an award. Usually several 'Ivors' are awarded each year and at the 1969 awards Space Oddity got a Special Award for Originality, whereas Where Do You Go To (My Lovely) received a separate award for The Best Song Musically and Lyrically.
- 7. Since 2009 *Guinness World Records* has recognised both/either as being the best-selling single of all time, although there are no accurate sales figures for *White Christmas* as it was first released in the days before 'proper' music charts.
- 8. The song's correct title is *Candle in the Wind 1997*. Occasionally it is incorrectly referred to as *Goodbye England's Rose*, which are the opening lyrics rather than the title.
- 9. 'Denali'—the mountain's indigenous and, since 2015, official name—is an equally-acceptable answer.
- 10. 'Wrist' is an equally acceptable answer.
- 11. Limburger cheese is also produced in Germany and The Netherlands.
- 12. Athena is also known as 'Athene' or 'Pallas'.
- 13. Questions that may require quite a bit of 'working out' are probably best placed at the start of a written round rather than at the end.
- 14. The first UEFA Cup matches were played on 14 September 1971.
