Notes

- 1. Pademelons are as closely related to kangaroos as they are to wallabies, so either is an acceptable answer (as are the all-encompassing terms 'macropod' and 'marsupial'). The principal difference between pademelons, wallabies and kangaroos is size.
- 2. This question is nonsensical as Marciano was famously undefeated throughout his professional career and retired when Berbick was less than two years old. If the words 'Rocky Marciano' are replaced with 'Muhammad Ali' then the question makes perfect sense.
- 3. 'Giulio' (Claudio's brother and fellow composer) is also an acceptable answer.
- 4. 'Kishinev' is an equally-acceptable answer.
- 5. *Ptosis* refers to a drooping or downward displacement of a part of the body. Whilst most commonly used in relation to the eyelids it may be used to describe the sagging of many other parts of the body.
- 6. Although commonly referred to as members of the Herring family, scientifically speaking anchovies belong to the family *Engraulidae*, whereas herrings are members of the family *Clupeidae*. Both belong to the same **order**, *Clupeiformes*.
- 7. An equally-acceptable answer is Taiwan's official/formal name: the Republic of China. (The official name of the country commonly referred to as 'China' is the <u>People's</u> Republic of China).
- 8. *Wahine* is also the word for 'woman' in Hawaiian, so 'USA' is also an acceptable answer.

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
