Notes

1. All question setters are reminded of the guideline on difficulty:
Don't make the questions too hard: this is the Stockport Quiz League, not University Challenge, and is meant to be a fun night out! All teams should be able to answer at least half of the questions correctly, so aggregate scores should never be lower than 80 and no team should score under 40 (an all-match average score in the range 50–65 is indicative of a 'decent' quiz).
Scores of 41, 42, 45, 43, 48, 41, 30, 27, 31 and 45 strongly suggest this quiz was too difficult.
Finding new teams for the league is hard enough; quizzes like this will not have teams queuing round the block to join up.
2. Pottery is the traditional gift for the ninth anniversary in the USA. Copper is the traditional gift in the UK. Steel is the traditional gift for the eleventh anniversary in the USA. There is no traditional gift in the UK.
3. All question setters are reminded of the guideline on pairing: pairs should be of similar difficulty. Admittedly this can be somewhat subjective, but *Graceland* is often cited as one of the best albums of all time, whereas *Ma Kelly's Greasy Spoon* failed to chart.
4. The board game *Sorry!* is also based on parchisi.
5. Firstly, the work's title is *The Banks of Green Willow*.
Secondly, it is an orchestral piece but it is based on a folk song of the same title, recorded by among others, Nic Jones, Martin Carthy, Dick Gaughan and Tony Rose. Therefore either "Anonymous" or "Traditional" would also be acceptable answers
6. Unless otherwise stated the theme should be related to a surname (as teams don't necessarily have to give a forename to answer a question correctly).
7. A more accurate description would be something like: a dashed line comprising two shades of pink.
8. Sleeping sickness is the alternative name for **African** trypanosomiasis. **American** trypanosomiasis is known as 'Chagas disease'.
9. The symbol for a national trail is an acorn beside the trail. Green diamonds by themselves represent a recreational route.
10. The question is badly phrased – if the words "in boxing history" are removed the answer is correct. The boxer who, in boxing history, had the most KOs was Billy Bird who was a welterweight, but never world champion (<http://boxrec.com/en/boxer/17871>)
11. Weil's Disease is a particular form of leptospirosis. Leptospirosis has many alternative names, including *seven-day fever*, *harvest fever*, *field fever*, *canefield fever*, *mild fever*, *rat-catcher's yellows*, *Fort Bragg fever*, *pretibial fever* and *rat fever*.
12. All question setters are reminded of the following guideline:
The required answer must be concise: teams should be able to answer in a few words at most. Don't set questions that require long-winded/complicated answers, as these often place an unfair burden on

the question master (QM), who may have to decide whether a given answer is 'correct enough'.

Clearly this question fails to comply with the above.

13. It would be clearer if the phrase was 'ex-President's wife' rather than 'Presidential', as Nicolas Sarkozy is no longer a President.

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
