Notes		

1. The phrase 'in the bag', meaning 'assured or secured', is of American origin (source: *OED*). It arose from a superstition of the New York Giants baseball team that if they removed the bag of balls from the field when in the lead they would win.

The bag in the House of Commons—behind the Speaker's chair—is where MPs deposit petitions presented to the House on behalf of members of the public or outside organisations (source: <u>www.parliament.uk</u>).

- 2. The African lungfish, which can survive out of water for up to two years, would appear to be the correct answer. Mudskippers can only last a few days.
- 3. If a specific answer is required it should be stressed in the wording of the question.
- 4. According to the Royal Mint website, T represents 'Tea', which is an acceptable answer. The coin itself has a teapot next to the T.
- 5. The CDU was founded in 1945 by a diverse group of former Weimar Republic politicians, among whom was Konrad Adenauer. More correctly Adenauer was the first **leader** of the CDU.
- 6. The River Druie is also an acceptable answer. It runs through Aviemore and joins the River Spey south of the town
- 7. There are **two** geological periods named after Welsh tribes. The other is the Ordovician period.
- 8. The same ingredients in the same proportions are used to make sponge cake, which is also a correct answer. Equally acceptable synonyms for pound cake are *quatre-quarts* (France), *panqué* (Mexico), *ponqué* (South America) and *Eischwerteig mit Fett* (Germany).
- 9. Strictly speaking Trappist beer is not a style of beer; it is beer that must be brewed in a Trappist monastery.
- 10. Bluto's name was changed to Brutus in the early 1960s and has sometimes reverted back, so either is an acceptable answer.

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
