Notes	
1.	The poem on which the national anthem of Greece (and Cyprus) is based comprises 158 stanzas, but only the first two are used as the official anthem. The longest national anthem musically is that of Uruguay—105 bars.

- The question should have specified that the required answer is a wine-growing region.
 Bordeaux is a wine-growing region, but is not a geographical/administrative region it lies within Nouvelle-Aquitaine.
- 3. There are **two** labrum cartilages. The given answer refers to the **glenoid** labrum in the shoulder (although 'scapula' is an equally correct/arguably better answer). There is also an **acetabular** labrum in the hip or pelvis, both of which are also acceptable answers.
- 4. There are several *lingulae* throughout the human body:
 - Part of one of the lobes of the left lung to which the given answer refers.
 - 'Brain' is also a correct answer as it is home to two: one in the cerebellum, the other in the fourth ventricle.
 - Additionally, there is a sphenoid lingula in the pelvis and a lingula also forms part of the mandible (lower jaw), although bones are not usually thought of as 'organs'.
- 5. The Rhône flows into the Mediterranean 'south of Lyon' in the same way that the River Severn enters the Bristol Channel 'south of Blackpool'.

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
