- 5. If the 'theme word' is contained in a person's first name, the question should state that the full name is required.
- 6. Equally acceptable answers are 'ourselves alone' and 'solely us'.
- 7. His real (birth) name—Vernon Wayne Howell—is also an acceptable answer.
