Notes

- 1. There are umpteen alternative and equally acceptable answers to this question, including 'golden mean', 'golden section', 'extreme and mean ratio', 'medial section', 'divine proportion', 'divine section', 'golden proportion', 'golden cut' and 'golden number'.
- 2. The 'Remain Pact' is more correctly known as 'Unite to Remain'.
- 3. As is customary with many Asian names, his surname is given first, so just 'Son' is an acceptable answer.
- 4. When words linked to the theme are 'hidden' within longer words it's probably a good idea (although not compulsory) to state this in the preamble.
- 5. J. S. Bach and Maurice Ravel are known primarily as composers rather than as piano players. Also Bach did not write any music for the piano, his compositions were for the organ, harpsichord and clavichord.
- 6. Currently it is officially known as Cynulliad Cenedlaethol Cymru (or National Assembly for Wales, in English). The name is due to change in May 2020, to Senedd Cymru (or Welsh Parliament).
- 7. Sinn Féin was founded on 28 November 1905, which is **114** years ago.
- 8. Keith Miles, the real name of Edward Marston, is an equally acceptable answer.
- 9. The more precise 'South American Bushmaster' or 'Atlantic Bushmaster' are equally acceptable (and arguably better) answers.

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
