- Unst is the most northerly inhabited island of the UK. The uninhabited Muckle Flugga and Out Stack are both further north. Out Stack is the correct answer, particularly as the paired question refers to the uninhabited Rockall.
- 4. 'Earl of Grantham' is an equally acceptable answer.
- 5. 'Thessalonica' is an equally correct answer, but obviously doesn't fit the theme.
- 6. Unless specified otherwise a surname only is an acceptable answer, so these two questions should probably have stated that full names were required.
- 7. The wording of this question is ambiguous: it is not clear whether the managers' names or the countries are required, so either should have been acceptable. Also, the correct name of the Austrian manager is Ralf Rangnick, not Ranwick.
